NOTES

- * Deferred students are encouraged to take a refresher math course such as Eng T 295R before or concurrent with Econ 378, 380, 381.
- 200-level field courses are intended as interim courses as a student moves from Econ 110 into the 300-level core courses. Once the student has completed Econ 380, he or she is strongly encouraged to take the 400-level rather than the 200-level field courses.
- Students should NOT take both a 200-level and a 400-level course with the same last two digits (e.g., Econ 275 and 475), although they ARE encouraged to take the 300-level and 500-level theory classes (e.g., Econ 380 and 580).
- **Minimum residence requirement is 21 hours in the major.**
- Students who plan no formal education beyond the bachelor's degree should take other courses that will enhance their employment opportunities. Consult a faculty advisor or your academic advisor for suggested minors, majors, and skills.
- It is recommended that students take no more than three economics courses per semester in order to succeed in the program **TIMELY GRADUATION POLICIES:** In order to encourage timely progress towards graduation, advisement centers may require mandatory advisement before students are allowed to register for classes. Deans, in consultation with advisement centers, may also place registration holds and mandate specific course completion in order to facilitate a timely graduation (University Undergraduate Catalog).

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Helpful Hints

- 1) Take Econ 378/388 and 380/382 in consecutive semesters. This will minimize the possibility of forgetting important material in the earlier course that you need to build upon in the latter course.
- 2) Complete the 300-level courses as soon as possible. You will understand the concepts taught in your 400/500-level electives much better if you have a firm foundation of basic core concepts.
- 3) Be aware of pre-requisites for 400/500-level courses as noted in the undergraduate catalog.
- 4) Meet with your academic advisor as early as you can, so you can discuss career options, internship opportunities, and additional coursework that can strengthen your application for graduate school and employment marketability.
